Curricular Innovations

Designed and implemented a regular set of popular undergraduate offerings that I regularly teach: Anthropology of Globalization (219), Anthropology of Food (314), Environmental Anthropology (217). Designed and implemented a set of regularly offered upper-level and graduate courses: Anthropology of Social Movements (473), Economic Anthropology (511), Environmental Anthropology (512), Dissertation Writing (594).

Designed and implemented a new course taught to modernize the Anthropology curriculum: "Virtual Lives: Science, Technology and Culture (208)." This is a World Cultures General Education course designed to be offered every Fall semester and designed to attract stem majors. This was our first large format course (80 students) to be offered at the 200-level. Course initiated in 2018.

As DUS, updated the curriculum by removing old courses, updating currently offered courses, and encouraging faculty to design new courses. Redesigned the curriculum to update elective/selective requirements, credits needed to graduate and terminology (2016-2019). Initiated outreach to Majors, general advisors, and integrated department into recruitment and orientation events in ways not previously undertaken. Wrote text for the department website and carried out outreach to alumni.

Engaged Humanities Initiative: Designed and implemented a course on the Anthropocene and climate change for freshmen enrolled in the Mellon-funded program to create a small liberal arts experience for UIC students. The course is writing intensive and requires students to write an ethnography about “ecological futures” in Chicago based on fieldtrips and interviews completed as a group and independently.
